Similarly, B.C.A. students may choose Social Media Marketing as elective, gaining insights into their field through interdisciplinary perspectives. Additionally, credit-based courses such as Digital Fluency and Artificial Intelligence encourage creative thinking, critical analysis, collaboration, and communication skills. Social service initiatives led by NSS, NCC, and various clubs and committees further enrich students' educational experience. These activities raise awareness about environmental, social, and health-related issues while fostering community engagement. Outreach programs, including medical camps, blood donation drives, and computer literacy initiatives, involve active collaboration among students, faculty, government agencies, and NGOs to address societal challenges. Through this comprehensive approach, St. Aloysius Degree College empowers students to become well-rounded individuals, equipped with the knowledge, skills, and empathy required to navigate and contribute effectively to a complex and interconnected world. This multidisciplinary strategy not only enhances academic learning but also prepares students to thrive in their personal and professional lives.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) Implementation The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) system has been introduced at Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) to streamline credit recognition, accumulation, transfer, and redemption. This formal mechanism allows students to deposit credits on the ABC platform, which remain valid for a maximum of seven years or as specified for their respective disciplines. Students were guided step-by-step to enroll on the official ABC portal at www.abc.gov.in. The procedure involved the following steps: Visit abc.gov.in and navigate to "My Account" > "Student." Existing DigiLocker users could sign in directly, while new users were instructed to click "Sign Up for Meri Pehchaan." After entering a mobile number and generating an OTP, they verified the details and completed the required fields to generate their unique ABC ID. Students submitted their ABC registration and ID details to the institution for records. The benefits of the ABC system were also communicated to students, emphasizing its flexibility and transparency. Key features include: Allowing multiple entry and exit points for students throughout their education journey. Storing credits for up to seven years. Facilitating credit transfers through a single-window system, subject to approval by the source and destination institutions.

Ensuring only verified academic institutions upload credits, thereby maintaining integrity. This system promotes a more student-centric and flexible approach to curriculum design, enabling a seamless academic experience while supporting lifelong learning opportunities.

17.Skill development:

Skill Development under NEP System The college has adopted the New Education Policy (NEP) system, which emphasizes skill development through a well-structured curriculum. This curriculum incorporates courses on language and communication skills, soft skills, life skills, and computing skills, ensuring holistic development. 1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

An academic calendar committee prepares the college's academic calendar in alignment with the University calendar of events, ensuring its timely finalization. The calendar accounts for mandatory working days per semester and holidays recognized at the state, central, regional, and local levels.

Each academic year begins with an orientation session led by the Principal and Heads of Departments. Class teachers provide a curriculum overview, discuss its implementation, and share details about student council elections, enrolment, and departmental activities.

To ensure effective curriculum delivery, workload allocation is done in departmental meetings based on faculty expertise. The timetable committee develops a detailed schedule for curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities, communicated to students via the college calendar, notice boards, and

announcements about guest lectures, field visits, and remedial classes. Subject teachers create teaching plans, and Heads of Departments monitor curriculum progress. Associations organize diverse activities such as internships, industrial visits, and field trips.

The IQAC reviews departmental activities, while the college library offers vital study resources. Faculty benefit from in-house development programs by experienced academicians. The institution collects feedback from students, faculty, alumni, and parents and provides subject-specific, skill-based, and value-added certificate courses annually.

1.1.2 - The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE)

The institution has an examination committee responsible for managing the continuous internal assessment process. In accordance with university guidelines, the committee conducts two Internal Assessment (IA) exams each semester.

Key responsibilities of the committee include preparing the exam timetable, printing question papers, assigning invigilation duties, evaluating answer scripts, addressing exam-related grievances, and organizing re-examinations when necessary. The committee also determines deadlines for submitting IA marks and ensures these marks are forwarded to the university at the end of each semester.

Students are actively enrolled in various associations, clubs, and cells, where their participation in events contributes to their overall credits. Academic coordinators notify students in advance about assignments, seminars, field visits, internships, and other activities. Internal assessment marks are allocated based on students' performance in these activities, along with their scores in Unit Tests, remedial assignments, projects, and presentations.

The assessment process emphasizes holistic evaluation, encouraging

students to engage in both academic and co-curricular activities. The final internal assessment marks, reflecting a combination of academic performance and active participation, are submitted to the university prior to the conclusion of each semester. This system ensures fair evaluation and fosters comprehensive student development.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The institution adopts a Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system to holistically assess and enhance student performance. This system ensures regular monitoring of learning levels and supports both advanced learners and slow learners through tailored programs. Internal assessments are conducted throughout the semester, with marks allocated based on the curriculum framework—40 marks for internal tests and 70 marks for pre-finals under CBCS, and 30 marks for internal tests and 60 marks for pre-finals under NEP.

To implement CIE effectively, the institution conducts two unit tests, one pre-final exam, and performance-based improvement tests each semester. Class teachers analyze test results to identify areas of improvement, and the performance of students is closely monitored by the Principal, who provides necessary feedback to faculty for further action.

For slow learners, subject teachers organize remedial classes and bridge courses to strengthen their understanding and improve their scores. Answer scripts are returned to students post-evaluation, ensuring transparency and allowing them to review and enhance their performance. The internal marks are displayed on

noticeboards for student verification before being uploaded to the university portal.

This robust CIE framework not only supports consistent academic development but also promotes accountability, fosters improvement, and ensures the success of students at all learning levels.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

The internal assessment mechanism at St. Aloysius Degree College is transparent, robust, and student-focused, ensuring fairness and effective evaluation. Internal assessments include test papers, assignments, seminars, and viva sessions, conducted twice every semester. The college's examination office, led by the senior superintendent and a team of faculty members, ensures the smooth organization of exams and adherence to the examination calendar. Special accommodations are provided for Divyangjan and sick students.

Transparency is maintained by announcing exam dates in advance and conducting tests in CCTV-monitored classrooms. Students can verify attendance and marks and report discrepancies. Marks are shared during parent meetings, fostering accountability. Evaluations emphasize consistent feedback, monitoring student progress, and experimenting with teaching methods to enhance learning. Assignments, seminars, and internal tests are promptly assessed, and key feedback is shared to help students improve. Students failing to meet benchmarks can retake tests, submit revised assignments, or deliver seminars.

The grievance redressal system ensures prompt resolution of issues. Internal marks and answer scripts are shared with students by departmental coordinators. Complaints are first addressed by staff guides and escalated to department and college-level grievance redressal cells if necessary. All grievances are resolved within a week of mark publication, reinforcing trust and efficiency in the process.

The mechanism to address internal examination-related grievances at St. Aloysius Degree College is transparent, time-bound, and efficient. The college ensures fairness and accountability through a well-defined grievance redressal system that prioritizes prompt resolution of issues.

After the internal assessment process, departmental coordinators share internal marks and answer scripts with students, allowing them to review their performance. Students can report discrepancies or raise concerns about their marks or evaluations. Initially, complaints are addressed by the staff guide, who consults with the course instructor to resolve the issue. If a student remains unsatisfied, the matter can be escalated to the department-level grievance redressal cell. For unresolved grievances, the issue is further referred to the college-level grievance redressal cell.

The entire process is designed to be swift and efficient, with all grievances being resolved within a week of internal mark publication. This time-bound approach ensures that students' concerns are addressed without delay, fostering trust and confidence in the system. By maintaining transparency and providing multiple levels of redressal, the college demonstrates its commitment to ensuring a fair and student-focused evaluation process. The institution's structured approach involves curriculum restructuring, innovative pedagogy, and refined assessment processes to enhance educational quality and relevance.

A dedicated OBE core committee ensures the systematic implementation of OBE, supported by departmental coordinators who oversee its grassroots execution. Faculty training, organized by the IQAC, equipped instructors with the skills to formulate measurable Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme-Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs). An OBE orientation session held on June 1, 2023, introduced assessment strategies and refined outcome formulation.

POs, PSOs, and COs are displayed on the college website, departmental noticeboards, and classrooms, ensuring transparency. Students are briefed during induction programs and introductory sessions about expected learning outcomes, fostering clarity and alignment with institutional goals.

The attainment of learning outcomes is measured using a 3-point scale based on student performance in tests, assignments, viva voce, and quizzes. Articulation matrices link COs to PSOs and POs, enabling a comprehensive evaluation of program-specific and overall outcomes. An Excel tool developed by the IQAC facilitates this process.

Detailed attainment analysis is reviewed by the OBE committee, which implements improvement strategies like remedial sessions, participative learning, and expert interactions to ensure continuous academic excellence.

Solid Waste Management: The college adopts a proactive approach to managing solid waste by implementing the 3Rs of environmental friendliness—Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. To facilitate this, dry waste is systematically collected from home and exchanged for stationery through a partnership with ITC-WoW.

Liquid Waste Management: To conserve water and prevent wastage, the college ensures that all water fixtures are leak-proof and has replaced Western-style toilets with more water-efficient Indian-style toilets. Additionally, a caretaker is employed to promptly address any water leakage from taps, pipes, tanks, or toilet flush systems. Water generated from the Reverse Osmosis (RO) system is reused for gardening and cleaning purposes, further promoting water conservation.

E-Waste Management: Recognizing the growing role of technology, St. Aloysius Degree College emphasizes reducing e-waste and encourages environmentally responsible disposal practices. The college raises awareness among students about minimizing e-waste and ensuring proper disposal methods. It has established an MOU with E-Sree Foundation (ITC-WoW) for certified e-waste management services. As part of this collaboration, obsolete equipment like computers and printers is sold as scrap, ensuring safe and eco-friendly disposal of electronic waste.

An academic calendar committee prepares the college's academic calendar in alignment with the University calendar of events, ensuring its timely finalization. The calendar accounts for mandatory working days per semester and holidays recognized at the state, central, regional, and local levels.

Each academic year begins with an orientation session led by the Principal and Heads of Departments. Class teachers provide a curriculum overview, discuss its implementation, and share details about student council elections, enrolment, and departmental activities.

To ensure effective curriculum delivery, workload allocation is done in departmental meetings based on faculty expertise. 2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The institution adopts a Continuous Internal Evaluation (CIE) system to holistically assess and enhance student performance. This system ensures regular monitoring of learning levels and supports both advanced learners and slow learners through tailored programs. Internal assessments are conducted throughout the semester, with marks allocated based on the curriculum framework—40 marks for internal tests and 70 marks for pre-finals under CBCS, and 30 marks for internal tests and 60 marks for pre-finals under NEP.

To implement CIE effectively, the institution conducts two unit tests, one pre-final exam, and performance-based improvement tests each semester. Class teachers analyze test results to identify areas of improvement, and the performance of students is closely monitored by the Principal, who provides necessary feedback to faculty for further action.

For slow learners, subject teachers organize remedial classes and bridge courses to strengthen their understanding and improve their scores. Answer scripts are returned to students post-evaluation, ensuring transparency and allowing them to review and enhance their performance. The internal marks are displayed on noticeboards for student verification before being uploaded to the university portal.

This robust CIE framework not only supports consistent academic development but also promotes accountability, fosters improvement, and ensures the success of students at all learning levels.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

The internal assessment mechanism at St. Aloysius Degree College is transparent, robust, and student-focused, ensuring fairness and effective evaluation. Internal assessments include test papers, assignments, seminars, and viva sessions, conducted twice every semester. The college's examination office, led by the senior superintendent and a team of faculty members, ensures the smooth organization of exams and adherence to the examination calendar. Special accommodations are provided for Divyangjan and sick students.

Transparency is maintained by announcing exam dates in advance and conducting tests in CCTV-monitored classrooms. Students can verify attendance and marks and report discrepancies. Marks are shared during parent meetings, fostering accountability. Evaluations emphasize consistent feedback, monitoring student progress, and experimenting with teaching methods to enhance learning. Assignments, seminars, and internal tests are promptly assessed, and key feedback is shared to help students improve. Students failing to meet benchmarks can retake tests, submit revised assignments, or deliver seminars.

The grievance redressal system ensures prompt resolution of issues. Internal marks and answer scripts are shared with students by departmental coordinators. Complaints are first addressed by staff guides and escalated to department and college-level grievance redressal cells if necessary. All grievances are resolved within a week of mark publication, reinforcing trust and efficiency in the process.

2.5.2 - Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

The mechanism to address internal examination-related grievances at St. Aloysius Degree College is transparent, time-bound, and efficient. The college ensures fairness and accountability through a well-defined grievance redressal

system that prioritizes prompt resolution of issues.

After the internal assessment process, departmental coordinators share internal marks and answer scripts with students, allowing them to review their performance. Students can report discrepancies or raise concerns about their marks or evaluations. Initially, complaints are addressed by the staff guide, who consults with the course instructor to resolve the issue. If a student remains unsatisfied, the matter can be escalated to the department-level grievance redressal cell. For unresolved grievances, the issue is further referred to the college-level grievance redressal cell.

The entire process is designed to be swift and efficient, with all grievances being resolved within a week of internal mark publication. This time-bound approach ensures that students' concerns are addressed without delay, fostering trust and confidence in the system. By maintaining transparency and providing multiple levels of redressal, the college demonstrates its commitment to ensuring a fair and student-focused evaluation process. This mechanism not only upholds academic integrity but also supports a positive learning environment.

Parent-Teacher Meetings also serve as a platform to communicate course outcomes effectively.

The OBE committee reviews these reports and recommends improvements, such as remedial sessions, participative learning techniques, and expert interactions, ensuring continuous enhancement of learning outcomes and educational quality.

St. Aloysius Degree College has effectively implemented Outcome-Based Education (OBE), emphasizing meaningful learning outcomes over mere credit accumulation. The institution's structured approach involves curriculum restructuring, innovative

pedagogy, and refined assessment processes to enhance educational quality and relevance.

A dedicated OBE core committee ensures the systematic implementation of OBE, supported by departmental coordinators who oversee its grassroots execution. Faculty training, organized by the IQAC, equipped instructors with the skills to formulate measurable Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme-Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs). An OBE orientation session held on June 1, 2023, introduced assessment strategies and refined outcome formulation.

POs, PSOs, and COs are displayed on the college website, departmental noticeboards, and classrooms, ensuring transparency. Students are briefed during induction programs and introductory sessions about expected learning outcomes, fostering clarity and alignment with institutional goals.

The attainment of learning outcomes is measured using a 3-point scale based on student performance in tests, assignments, viva voce, and quizzes. Articulation matrices link COs to PSOs and POs, enabling a comprehensive evaluation of program-specific and overall outcomes. An Excel tool developed by the IQAC facilitates this process.

Detailed attainment analysis is reviewed by the OBE committee, which implements improvement strategies like remedial sessions, participative learning, and expert interactions to ensure continuous academic excellence.

St. Aloysius Degree College is committed to minimizing its environmental impact and actively works to reduce and manage the waste generated on campus. The institution has devised several specific procedures aimed at contributing to environmental protection and fostering sustainability.

Solid Waste Management: The college adopts a proactive approach to managing solid waste by implementing the 3Rs of environmental friendliness—Reduce, Reuse, and Recycle. To facilitate this, dry waste is systematically collected from home and exchanged for stationery through a partnership with ITC-WoW.

Liquid Waste Management: To conserve water and prevent wastage, the college ensures that all water fixtures are leak-proof and has replaced Western-style toilets with more water-efficient Indian-style toilets. Additionally, a caretaker is employed to promptly address any water leakage from taps, pipes, tanks, or toilet flush systems. Water generated from the Reverse Osmosis (RO) system is reused for gardening and cleaning purposes, further promoting water conservation.

E-Waste Management: Recognizing the growing role of technology, St. Aloysius Degree College emphasizes reducing e-waste and encourages environmentally responsible disposal practices. The college raises awareness among students about minimizing e-waste and ensuring proper disposal methods.
